Who are our older community members?

Population

Penrith City LGA is home to a diverse and active older population.


Since 2016, this age cohort grew by 5,378 people, increasing in proportion from 11.7% of the total population.





Every suburb of Penrith City LGA is home to older residents.

of Penrith City LGA's older residents were born in Australia, with 45% born overseas¹

Just under half of all older residents in Penrith City LGA who were born overseas arrived in Australia before 1970.



Health


Disability and need for assistance are strongly correlated with age. Therefore, a significantly higher proportion of older residents had a need for assistance due to disability than the overall population.

65.5% of Penrith City LGA's 65-84 year olds had at least one long-term health condition.

The housing needs of the older residents of Penrith City LGA are diverse. While many live independently in our community, many also need support.





Most older residents in Penrith City LGA live in separate houses. Since 2016, there has been an increase in high-density housing.










Housing tenure










Income

Our older population are earning less than the wider Penrith LGA population, this is relative to their participation in the workforce.





The median household income is \$1,124, lower than that of the wider Penrith City LGA, \$1,866.

Low-income households are defined as those with \$800 of gross weekly income or less.

Summary

13% of the population is aged over 65 years.

Almost three quarters of older residents have a need for assistance due to disability.

Over half (58%) of residents aged 65 and over live in lone-person households.

Over 60% of Penrith City LGA's 65-84 year olds had at least one long-term health condition.

1 in 5 residents aged 85+ live in nursing homes or residential care facilities.
